New regulations requiring food orders to be retained for 28 days

Our Surveillance Rights Director, Elizabeth Farries, spoke on RTÉ Radio 1 Morning Ireland, q102, FM104 and Today FM outlining our concerns regarding the surveillance that the new regulations, in effect from 4 September, appear to provide for. We question whether this statutory instrument meets the proportionality and necessity requirements, and whether a data protection impact assessment was carried out.

Invitation to Special Oireachtas Committee on the COVID-19 response

We received and accepted an invitation to make a submission and to attend the <u>Committee</u> <u>meeting</u> on the legislative framework underpinning the State's response to the pandemic on Wednesday, 9 September.

Our opposition to the use of spit hoods

This week, we issued a <u>press release</u> ahead of the review by An Garda Síochána on the use of spit hoods. We have previously written to the Garda Commissioner twice expressing our opposition to their use on the basis that this may constitute inhumane or degrading treatment under international human rights law. A leading manufacturer has also confirmed that they are not effective in protecting against the spread of covid-19. As a statutory body,An Garda Síochána is obliged to carry out a human rights impact assessment of all new practices. We call for any assessment carried out to be published.

We also believe the use of the term "anti-spit guard" is misleading as it gives the false impression that a spit hood is a piece of PPE equipment, as opposed to a restraining device.
